

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SEWI LSTA Continuing Education Grants Guidelines & Process

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Description

The Southeastern Wisconsin (SEWI) library region comprises the following public library systems: Arrowhead, Bridges, Kenosha County, Lakeshores, Milwaukee County Federated and Monarch Library Systems. The SEWI library systems are collaborating to provide continuing educational grants, funded by IMLS and the Wisconsin Department of Instruction. The grants will be awarded to member libraries through an application process, enabling staff to participate in library-related continuing education programs produced by a library or educational organization other than SEWI and its public library system partners. Libraries may apply for a CE Grant to help fund a staff inservice or staff training workshop. A library may also apply for a CE grant to cover substitute library staff or extra staff hours to cover regular staff so they can attend a CE activity. Grant funds will be coordinated by Laurie Freund, SEWI/Bridges Library System with Lakeshores Library System serving as the fiscal agent.

The intent of this program is to supplement local continuing education efforts, not to supplant them. Funds are based on the LSTA funds available for SEWI library systems. Listed below is a limit, not a guaranteed amount, for each library. The amounts are based on the library's service population and grouped according to the minimum director certification levels for that population. Grant funds are to reimburse the libraries for continuing educational activities **through June 2022**.

Grant Dollar Library Limits

- \$3,000 based on 500,000+ service population: Milwaukee Public Library and its branches
- \$2,000 based on 100,000+ service population: Kenosha Public Library and its branches and Racine Public Library
- \$1,300 for the following libraries, based on 50,000+ service population: Hedberg Public Library (Janesville), Waukesha, Mead Public Library (Sheboygan), West Allis, and West Bend Public Libraries
- \$1,100 for all other libraries with populations of 6,000+ requiring directors to have a Grade I certification. See list **here** and click on the \$1,100 Grade 1 tab.
- \$900 for all other libraries with populations 3,000-5,999 requiring directors to have a Grade 2 or 3 certification. See list **here** and click on the \$900 Grade 2 or 3 tab.
- Note: \$500 maximum per grant application (exceptions will be made for classes for Public Library Director Certification and for library in-service staff training or program)

Grant applications will be reviewed and applicants notified the first week of each month.

Persons Eligible

- Any staff member of any public library in the SEWI region
- Public libraries in the SEWI region (Arrowhead, Bridges, Kenosha County, Lakeshores, Milwaukee County Federated and Monarch Library Systems)

Eligible Activities

- Conference or pre-conference (in-state or out-of-state) by a library or relatable non-library organization to enhance professional growth
- Workshop or webinar by a library or non-library agency or organization to enhance professional growth
- Expenses related to CE event attendance (mileage, meals, lodging, parking)
- Course or class offered by an accredited academic institution for relatable topics such as business, Internet, management, etc.
- Substitute library staff costs or extra staff hours to cover library services in order for regular staff to attend a learning activity

Eligible Activities with limitations

Attendance at library or relatable non-library conferences

Grant applications will be accepted ONLY when the conference registration is open. This applies to library conferences involving one or more days of in-person or online conference and pre-conference programs sponsored by a library organization, accredited library information school or other creditable and relatable non-library organization. Registration and travel costs (mileage, meals, lodging, parking) may be included up to a maximum of

\$500. Paid receipts or invoices will need to be submitted for reimbursement.

Staff in-service or staff training

Libraries may apply for a CE grant to help fund a presenter or trainer for a library staff inservice or training program. SEWI will reimburse a library for a presenter's or trainer's fees up to the library amount limit. Funds awarded will count toward a library's grant limit for this grant cycle. Funds may not be used for other costs (refreshments, staff time, supplies, etc.). Paid receipts or invoices will need to be submitted for reimbursement.

Non-eligible Activities

- Costs associated with participating on committees
- Course work leading to a person's bachelor's or master's degree, or certificate program
 - Exceptions include courses for <u>Public Library Director Certification</u>
- Costs of tours and special events associated with a conference.

Eligible Expenses

- Tuition, fee, or registration fees. Conference fees are based on early registration and member fees. Individuals must cover the difference between member and non-member fees.
- Mileage reimbursed at the IRS rates as of 2021 (\$.56/mile)
- Meals reimbursed at (\$50 a day maximum). #heading=h.zavrkqofy5nhException: Covers set cost of a meal when it is part of a meeting/program.
- Lodging
- Other, such as parking and transportation

Non-eligible Expense

- Individual's salary for the time spent at the program
- Individual membership fees for state, national, or regional associations

Process for CE grant

- Library staff person submits an application using the online <u>SEWI LSTA CE Grant</u>
 <u>Application</u>. Applicants will receive notice the first week of the month (new applications are reviewed monthly).
- Library uses local funds to pay fee or expenses
- CE Grant recipients will upload scanned receipts or paid invoices in an online <u>SEWI LSTA</u>
 <u>CE Grant Reimbursement Request</u> form
- The library (not the individual) will receive reimbursement
- Grant recipients will complete a <u>SEWI LSTA CE Grant Recipient Evaluation</u> within 30 days
 of the completion of the continuing education activity or library staff in-service program or
 training.

It's important to practice this muscle of radical imagination so that we can imagine and then create the institutions we're all deserving of but that don't yet currently exist.
